Overview of the Clean California Local Grant Program



Legislative Goals

- 1. <u>Reduce the amount of waste and debris</u> within public rights-ofway, pathways, parks, transit centers, and other public spaces.
- 2. Enhance, rehabilitate, restore, or install measures to <u>beautify and</u> <u>improve public spaces</u> and mitigate the urban heat island effect.
- 3. <u>Enhance public health, cultural connection, and community</u> <u>placemaking</u> by improving public spaces for walking and recreation.
- 4. Advance equity for underserved communities.



Budget

- Approximately \$100 million in available grant funding
- Anticipate most awarded projects will be \$3 million or less

Overview of the Guidelines and Updates for Cycle 2





Applicants

- Local or regional public agencies, transit agencies, or federally recognized tribal governments
 - Nonprofit organizations may partner with eligible applicants, as subapplicants.



Eligibility

Number of Applications per Agency

- Unlimited.
- (New) You will be asked to identify your organization's priority application.

Project Types

- Infrastructure related community litter abatement and beautification projects.
- Non-infrastructure related community litter abatement events and/or educational programs.





Project Area

- Public spaces such as local streets and roads, tribal lands, parks, pathways, and transit centers.
- The applicant must have jurisdiction to make improvements to project area.
- (NEW) Project must be:
 - Partially or fully located in an underserved community, **AND**
 - At least 75% of the population surrounding the project site(s) must be underserved.



Eligibility

Examples of Eligible Activities and Expenses

- Amenities related to proper waste collection or prevention.
- Shade trees or drought-tolerant plantings.
- Art installations.
- Walking and/or biking facilities.
- Wayfinding signage.
- Seating and play equipment.
- Public bathrooms and water fountains.





Eligibility

Examples of Ineligible Activities and Expenses

- (New) Stipends and gift cards for volunteers.
- Displacing people experiencing homelessness.
- Acquisition of right-of-way or land.
- Acquisition of vehicles or shuttle programs.
- Maintenance of a project improvement for this grant agreement.
- Work performed prior to the execution of the grant agreement with Caltrans or after the expiration of the grant agreement.

- Option 1. Area Median Income
- Option 2. CalEnviroScreen
- Option 3. National School Lunch Program
- Option 3. Healthy Places Index
- Option 4. Native American Tribal Lands

Local Match Requirement

- Can range from 0% to 50% of the total grant amount request, based on the severity of disadvantage of the community surrounding the project.
 - Tribes automatically qualify for 0%





Local Match Requirement

SOD of

surrounding = Weighted average of the SODs of the surrounding census tracts.

community

= Sum [(Pop. CT 1 x metric score CT 1) + (Pop. CT 2 x metric score CT 2) + (Pop. CT N x metric score CT N...)]

Sum(Pop. CT 1 + Pop. CT 2 + Pop. of CT N...)

Where:

- **Pop. CT** = Population of a census tract within a $\frac{1}{2}$ mile radius of the project site or sites.
- Metric Score = The underserved community score of a census tract is determined using one of the allowable goptions listed in Table 2 of the guidelines.



Local Match Requirement

- Local match sources:
 - Cash
 - Third party in-kind contributions. Examples:
 - Plants/trees
 - Art materials or labor
 - Equipment and materials
 - Volunteered time from stakeholders

Scoring Criteria

Narrative (30/100 pts)

- Where to tell the "story" of your project.
- Asked to discuss:
 - Public engagement
 - Project deliverability
 - Maintenance plan
- (New) In Cycle 2, changes to Narrative are:
 - Discuss Demonstrated Community Need and Project Outcomes here.
 - Provide more detail.

Attachment A: Project Narrative Template

Directions

- Complete all sections in this form. Even if a section is not applicable to your project, write "N/A". Do not leave any sections blank.
- Provide succinct and complete responses in each section. The Narrative should include all pertinent information not already stated, or not explained sufficiently, in other application sections.
- THIS FORM SHALL NOT EXCEED 10 PAGES. If you need additional space, you can delete these directions. Do not change the font in this form to include more information.
- Do not assume that the application reviewer is familiar with your community. For more information on what the Narrative should include, see the section "Narrative" in the Program Guidelines.
- Save the form as a .PDF and ensure its size does not exceed 5 MB. If it does, when you
 try to attach it to your application you will get a message stating it exceeds 5 MB and
 you will not be able to submit your application until you attach a Narrative that is 5
 MB or smaller.
- Attach the PDF to your application, in section 3.1, "ATTACHMENTS", in the Attachment A: Project Narrative field. If you don't attach a Project Narrative to your application, you will not be able to submit it.

A.1 PROJECT LOCATION AND DESCRIPTION

(REPLACE TEXT) Briefly describe:

- The public space or spaces to be addressed. Specify whether the space(s) is considered public right-of-way, a park, a pathway, a transit center, tribal land, or another type of space. Describe where the space is located, including its visibility and access to the public. See the section "Eligible Project Area" in the Program Guidelines for more information.
- Any important details about the project not already stated in the application in section 1.8, "PROJECT DESCRIPTION".
- If applicable, any art, gateway monuments, or community identification pieces included in the
 project. At a minimum, the description should include the type of piece considered (a.g. a mural

Scoring Criteria

Project's Relative Population Benefit (PB) to Underserved Communities (30/100 pts)

- A calculation to determine how much of the population surrounding your project site(s) is underserved, relative to the total population surrounding your site(s)
- (New) This calculation has been simplified

Scoring Criteria

Scope, Cost, and Schedule (40/100 pts)

- (New) Simplified and streamlined
- Considerations when building a schedule:
 - If your project touches Caltrans right of way
 - If your project includes art
 - Time for bidding and subcontracts
 - Time for processing the grant agreement





Competitive Projects

- Projects that are more usable by the community and demonstrate a severity of need
- Projects with tangible and lasting benefits, such as infrastructure projects
- Shovel-ready projects
- Projects that are NOT near any other funded Clean CA projects
- Projects by agencies who didn't get funding in Cycle 1
 Based on stakeholder feedback after the workshop, we have decided to rescind this and will remove this in our next version of the guidelines.

- We will be more selective this cycle, based on a project's benefit to underserved communities, ability to deliver on time, and demonstrated severity of need.
- We will simplify the scoring and application process for Cycle 2.
